Using mock juries and a trial involving charges of child sexual abuse, the research investigates whether conducting joint trials and admitting tendency evidence infringe defendants' rights to a fair trial.

The research involved 90 mock jury deliberations involving more than 1,000 people who were eligible to be jurors.
