The NSW Government is seeking to appoint the inaugural Chief Commissioner to lead the soon-tobe-established Law Enforcement Conduct Commission ("LECC").

This new statutory agency is being established to provide for the independent detection, investigation and exposure of serious misconduct within the NSW Police Force and the NSW Crime Commission. The LECC will also independently monitor and review investigations by the NSW Police Force of complaints about the conduct of their officers. The LECC will also monitor critical incident investigations conducted by the NSW Police Force.

The Chief Commissioner will lead the establishment of the LECC, a new statutory agency, which will commence operations in early 2017. The Chief Commissioner will have a well-developed understanding of law enforcement and policing principles, issues and current trends, particularly relating to identifying and addressing corruption and maladministration. The successful incumbent will also have the demonstrated ability to judiciously use wide ranging oversight and investigatory powers. To be considered for the role of Chief Commissioner of the LECC, candidates must be a serving or retired superior court Judge from an Australian jurisdiction.

High quality candidates will have outstanding leadership skills and experience at a senior level within the judiciary. The ability to lead an organisation and inspire their team through a time of change is critical. They will have strong consultation experience, exceptional negotiation and communications skills, and an ability to advise and engage at executive levels of government, and the law enforcement sector.
