She has been pivotal in putting these critical issues on the national agenda for important reforms to improve Aboriginal lives across the country, not only in remote communities.

Named as one of the 50 most influential women in the world for her work in improving the lives of people living in remote Aboriginal communities, June is an esteemed national leader in the work of community reconstruction.
