Globally, four billion people live outside the protection of the law. At International Justice Mission, we believe everyone deserves to be safe. We don't stop at just rescuing people who have been abused – our ultimate goal is to prevent the violence from happening in the first place.

IJM is a global team of lawyers, investigators, social workers, community activists and other professionals at work in nearly 20 communities in the developing world to protect the poor from violence.

Inspired by God's call to love all people and to seek justice for the oppressed, IJM protects the poor from violence, irrespective of race, religion or any other factor, and seeks to work alongside all people of goodwill.

IJM's philosophy is simple:

When public justice systems are made to protect the poor – and slave owners, traffickers and other criminals can no longer act with impunity – millions of vulnerable men, women and children will never be abused.

Charina's Story

Charina was just 13 when she was sold into a brothel.

Charina was rescued in 2007 and began the road to restoration through IJM aftercare.

During the trial of Charina's trafficker courts were backlogged, hearings were frequently cancelled or rescheduled months apart.

7 years later Charina's trafficker was finally convicted in court.



Nearly 2 million children are exploited in the commercial sex trade worldwide.

Yet in **Cebu, the Philippines, International Justice Mission** has seen ground-breaking results in its anti-trafficking work.

Why is the time right now?

Project Lantern | Phase 1 Proving the Model

Test: In 2006, IJM initiated Project Lantern to test a powerful strategy: When laws are enforced, children are protected from sex traffickers.

Approach: In partnership with the local government of Cebu, IJM lawyers, social workers and investigators:

- · Trained police and prosecutors
- · Assisted local law enforcement with rescue operations
- Helped local organisations strengthen aftercare services for victims
- Represented victims ensuring their cases were heard in court

Result: Between 2006 and 2010, IJM and local authorities rescued more than 220 individual victims and secured the arrest of nearly 90 suspected perpetrators. After four years of partnership, independent researchers found 79% fewer children being sold for sex in Metro Cebu.




Project Lantern | Phase 2 Sustaining Gains

Given Phase 1's success, why Phase 2?

Despite these successes, barriers to effective law enforcement remain. In Phase 2, IJM and it's local partners will maintain the reduction in prevalence of sex trafficking in Metro Cebu and address the most significant underlying problems in the local justice system.

As IJM Australia, we have made the strengthening of Cebu's justice system a strategic priority.

When laws are enforced, the violence stops!



How your billable hour can transform lives:



1 hour

= 2 weeks and one day of a social worker's salary



2 hours 15 minutes

= 1 month of a social worker's salary



3 hours

= 1 month of a lawyer's salary



30 hours

= 1 social worker's annual salary



40 hours

= 1 lawyer's annual salary

*Based on an average individual lawyer's charge-out rate of \$500



Today, Charina is a strong young mother, determined to give her son the opportunities she should have had herself.

Recently, she stood before a group of other trafficking survivors and counsellors.

"If I was not rescued, I would still be standing over there," she said, pointing in the direction of the pier where she had once been routinely sold and exploited.

"Now we can help other girls."
